



- THE CONSERVATION COMMITTEE has set the date of Saturday, April 21, 1990, for our major cleanup effort. This date coincides closely with National Earth Day, which falls on Sunday, April 22. Cleanup effort will focus on removing major dumps in the same area as last year, approximately, with the cooperation of Montgomery and Howard County's and State government agencies. Volunteers will be needed; more about this later. Meanwhile, a smaller cleanup effort will be made locally in February or March.

A MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT (MOA) was signed om November 14, 1989, between the Army Corps of Engineers and the Environmental Protective Agency (EPA) that sets national criteria

for the preservation of wetlands, to become effective by December 15, 1989. Emplementation was delayed by the White House staff until January 15, 1990, and could be further delayed. President Bush needs to know that further delays or weakening of the Agreement should be firmly resisted. Conservationists should keep informed and act accordingly.

THE SUCCESS OF OUR 1989 GUN SHOW has stimulated planning for the 1990 Gun Show on November 3 and 4, 1990. Flyers with registration coupons will soon be available. Charlie Douglass is again Chairman. We'll keep you informed.

AN ARTICLE ABOUT THE TONGASS NATIONAL FOREST appeared in the December issue of the MARYLAND WALTONIAN, referring to the rape of this beautiful area under the auspices and subsidization of the Federal Government. Ada and I sailed the length of this vast forest in 1974 on our way to northern Alaska. Starting at Vancouver Island, we took the British Columbia Ferry to Prince Rupert. B.C., then the Alaska State Ferry to Juneau, stopping briefly at Ketchican, Wrangell, Petersburg, and Sitka, finally flying from Juneau to Glacier Bay National Park. As we passed between the many islands and the mountainous shore lines of the INside Passage, we could see many areas of clear cutting, marring the pristine beauty. Some passages were so narrow that we could clearly see, count and photograph the many bald eagles perched in the trees. Occasionally a whale would broach, blow, toss its tail flippers and disappear again. At Glacier Bay, seals, orcas, dolphins and many sea and shore birds were present. The Park LOdge at Glacier Bay is located on its shore, in the midst of the rain forest, which we could observe at first hand. Rainfall along this southeast coast of Alaska averages 160 to 200 inches a year, so trees grow fairly rapidly; however, soil is not very deep, and few trees have tap roots. Glacier Bay was formed within the last 500 years, as the ice melted and cracked, helped along by many severe earthquakes, so that flora and geology still being revealed gives one clues to the way the world was at the end of the last ice age.
