RIFLE AND PISTOL RANGE REPORT

SHOOTING HOURS: Permitted rifle/pistol range shooting hours are posted on the box which contains the range sign-in register. For August 2005, starting time is 10 AM daily and ending time is 8:00 PM, unless some activity has preempted the range.

HUNTER SIGHT-

IN/QUALIFICATION DAYS: The WAC will hold two hunter qualification events this fall -- one on Sunday, September 18, and the second on Sunday, November 6. On both days registration will start at 9:30 AM. Then we will qualify groups of prospective hunters in ten-person relays between 10:00 AM and approximately noon, concentrating first on shotgun (slug) hunters and inserting relays of muzzleloaders as appropriate. There is a \$5.00 fee for each qualification attempt. Afternoons, from around noon until 2:30 PM we will provide individual assistance for prospective hunters who need to sight in their firearms before attempting to qualify. The fee for sight-in assistance is

\$5.00 per firearm. Those who wish to qualify after signing in may do so individually for a separate fee of \$5.00 per attempt. During the afternoon, we will provide qualification for rifles and handguns as well as shotguns and muzzleloaders. Remember, you are expected to qualify with the firearm you will be using to hunt with. The rifle range will be closed during these events. Ray Shaver is seeking volunteers to work as range safety officers during the qualification process and one on one with prospective hunters for the sight-in activity.

AUGUST SITE MAINTENANCE: The next monthly maintenance of WAC ranges, Christmas trees, house and grounds will be done from 9:30 AM until 1 PM on Sunday, August 28. Please report to the maintenance coordinator, Chuck Limparis, at the green equipment shed for an assignment.

CONSERVATION REPORT

The Conservation Committee met on August 2nd and finalized plans for the tree planting on Saturday, 15 October and the Fall Clean Up on Saturday, 22 October. Work parties will meet at the chapter and/or the planting site on Friday, 14 October. We have a few volunteers already but could use more including (hopefully) Ed Burrows and Bill Gazdik. Materials for the planting should begin arriving this month.

We plan on doing an inventory of our Elms on the August work day and order liners to replace dead trees. The replacements will be planted on the September work day.

Several members of the WAC have now become members of Lois Green-Sligo (LGS) chapter. We continue to work with LGS on the clean up and pond. It recently came to our attention that LGS has some problems more pressing than getting the pond in good shape these include an inspection for the house they rent out and repairs to their pavilion.

Bill Ladd and Michelle Chesnut will cochair the September meeting of the Conservation Committee.

TARGET CLINIC

An any rifle, any sight, target clinic will be offered on September 10 at the Chapter House beginning at 9:00 AM. The clinic will include rifles with scopes in addition to iron sight rifles. The clinic introductory will approximately one hour followed by a live fire exercise at the rifle range beginning at 10:00 - 10:30 AM. Participants should bring their own rifles and 60 rounds of ammunition. The rifles can be either center fire or rim fire. The live fire exercise will follow the NRA's 50 round National Match Course of fire. Each participant must have adequate eye and hearing protection. Additional items, such as shooting mats and spotting scopes, will be provided if the clinic participant have their does not own accessories.

Clinic participants will be paired with experienced shooters during the live fire exercise. Those that complete the clinic will be eligible for Civilian Marksmanship Program (CMP) qualification and the purchase of rifles, ammunition and accessories offered by CMP. Participants will be well on their way to participation in future center fire events on a regular basis.

Prior experience is not necessary. Open to all Chapter members and their family. Juniors should be 16 or older and accompanied by a parent or guardian.

HAM RADIO CLUB

At the July, 2005 General Membership Meeting, Hank VanDeursen gave a presentation about "amateur radio" and is looking to organize a Ham Radio Club among the members of the Wildlife Achievement Chapter. Hank also mentioned that the group intends to provide a ham radio station that will have its own FCC "club license" and call sign. Hank mentioned that ham radio systems are already being used to collect data

from remote collection sites in order to monitor weather, physical, chemical and other attributes of the environment in remote locations. The club also intends to use donated equipment and antennas for the first radio station and that the first antenna could be hidden in the attic of the chapter house. After the presentation, President Jim Pieteski requested that Hank and several other members interested in organizing the club form an ad hoc committee to study this new adventure. At the Board of Directors meeting on August 3, 2005, it was decided that the new Ham Radio committee should be overseen by the Second Vice President.

On August 3, 2005, the Ham Radio Club ad hoc committee consisting of Hank VanDeursen (chair & FCC licensed operator), Joe Handley (FCC licensed operator) and Paul Leggett (CB and Ship To Shore operator) met with the incoming Second Vice President (Steve Lefebvre) to discuss their goals, physical and equipment requirements and other issues. At that time, the members of the committee determined that they themselves could donate enough equipment to set up a complete amateur radio station. Additionally, it was determined that a couple of months would be needed in order to complete and deliver an application to the FCC for a club license and to set up the radio station.

On Saturday, 16 July, the Chapter held the second annual Breakin[™] Clay to Save the Bay fundraiser. It was great to see the shooting sports and conservation advocates working together support such an important cause.

The damp weather didn't hamper the enthusiasm of the approximately 60 participants of all skill levels and raised \$1,850, a 30% increase from last year!

Heather Hetzeck of Chesapeake Bay Foundation (CBF) was on hand to talk about CBF's programs and answer Bayrelated questions. Sandy Burk, biologist, member of the Izaak Walton League, and author of Let the River Run Silver Again, also participated in the event. She was on hand with copies of her book about the local shad restoration project and spoke with attendees about conservation programs and youth involvement. Many participants took advantage of this opportunity to discuss the importance of habitat protection and conservation of our natural resources with these experts.
