


Figure 2 - Tom making sure that the trail is clear before sending a shuttle down the range road. (Photo by Tony Evans)

<u>CHANGES IN RANGE ACCESS RULES</u> (Joe Gick)

As of April 1, 2007, every member who shoots on *any range*, including the rifle range, pistol ranges, outdoor air rifle range, the archery range, and the skeet/trap ranges, must be visibly wearing a Range Access card. If you do not have one, you must attend a Range Orientation class, held at 10:00 A.M. on the last Sunday of the month. (Check the online calendar at www.damascusIWLA.org)

The only exception to wearing a Range Access card is if you are shooting in an event where non-members are invited that are not specific guests of members under current Chapter Rules. Such events include Cowboy Action Shoots, Seneca Valley Matches, Breaking Clay to Save the Bay, etc.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

CONSERVATION (Meo Curtis and Bill Ladd)

Tuesday June 5

Timothy Warman from the National Wildlife Federation gave an excellent presentation on how climate change is affecting wildlife distribution and survival in the United States. He gave a very positive outlook on what we can do to reduce the effects of the documented temperature increases. There was a very poor turn out that night so we have invited Tim to an upcoming member meeting and a second opportunity to learn what each individual can do to help protect habitat for fish, fowl, and furred friends as well as for future generations.

Sunday June 10th Adopt-A-Road

We had enough volunteers to cover our adopted segment of Mullinix Mill Road plus sections of Long Corner and Gue Rd. We picked up 12 bags of trash, one large black plastic tarp, and an old mid-size (maybe 19") television set. I asked the participants about the type of trash they found. They all said that beverage containers were the major culprits--beer cans and bottles in particular. There was a lesser amount of 'fast food' and Styrofoam cups and other miscellaneous items. Perhaps this year, the 'bottle bill' will be adopted in Maryland as it has been in 11 other states and the 'cash for return' will keep some of that litter off the road. The next Adopt-A-Road will be on Sunday August 19--meet at the maintenance shed at 8:30 a.m.

RIFLE AND PISTOL RANGE REPORT (Guy Wright)

SHOOTING HOURS: Permitted rifle and pistol range shooting hours are posted on the box, which contains the range sign-in register, as well as above the range entry card reader. For July 2007, starting time is 10:00 AM daily and ending time is 8:00 PM, unless some activity has preempted the range (see "Upcoming Events Affecting Range Availability" below).

NEW ITEMS

25 Yard Targets Removed From Rifle Range because rounds fired at those targets have been impacting on the target backer steel supports on the 50 yard berm, cutting many of them in half. A moveable target is being constructed to be used as a close-in target to assist in <u>sighting in new rifle scopes only</u>, with the admonishment that the shooters be aware of where their rounds are going. Please use the covered pistol ranges for 25 yard rim fire shooting.

REMINDERS

Chapter Speed Limit: The speed limit for our property is 10mph. It was established for safety and to limit dust during the dry season. This speed limit is especially important on the road leading to the Rifle and Pistol Range. You can never tell when you will meet a car from the opposite direction and it helps keep gravel on the road at the turns, instead of having it thrown to the shoulders because of excessive speed.

Plywood Donations: Your donations of plywood for use as target backers on the rifle and pistol ranges are always welcome. For backers, the plywood should be 1/2 inch or thicker and either pre-cut or capable of being cut into pieces 2'x2' (pistol range) or 2'x4' (rifle range). Please help keep the WAC looking good by dropping off your donations by the sliding door on the back side of the green equipment shed; that is, at the side nearest the chapter house. Thanks

Rifle and Pistol Range Rules: The rules governing Rifle and Pistol Range safety, conduct, permissible firearms, and violation policy are posted at the covered pistol range, the covered rifle range, the notice board between the pistol ranges, the notice board at the path leading to the covered rifle range, on the chapter WEB site (damascusiwla.org) and in MS Word format from me via email, when requested. Sometimes questions come up. Though our bylaws indicate that you can call any Board of Directors member about these rules, you will be

better served to start with the folks closest to them, i.e., range orientation instructors or the committee chairman

Blacksmithing Committee (Dick Smith)

The Blacksmithing Committee provided four demonstrators for the Thunder Valley Days event on Friday and Saturday, June 22-23. Prior to the event, we presented a branding iron to Chuck Crooks with the letters "TVD". Joe Gick and I also demonstrated for an event in Brookville, Maryland, at the Oakley slave cabin on Brookville Road on Saturday and Sunday, June 23-24. This event was part of the Heritage Day Celebration sponsored by the Montgomery County Park and Planning Commission. This coming Friday, July 13, Joe Gick and I will be demonstrating for a group of schoolchildren at the Sandy Spring Museum. And, as usual, we are at the forge at the WAC pole barn every Saturday from 9-3 that we are not committed elsewhere. We run classes there for any IKE who is interested in learning the craft and look forward to seeing you there. Check with me first (dsmith@lofstrand.com) to be sure that someone

will be at the forge.

We currently have four working forges, plenty of

we currently have four working forges, plenty of tools and coal. A frequent question (aside from "Do

you make horseshoes?") is about the fuel used in the forges. We use exclusively low sulfur soft coal that we convert into coke in the forge. We accomplish this by roasting wet coal that surrounds a central fire. The heat from the fire drives off the oils and other volatile organic components, leaving a porous material

(coke) that is mostly composed of carbon. Wetting the coal first with water prevents the fire from consuming the coke during the process, a process that produces large volumes of acrid green smoke that perfumes the air.
