## DAMASCUS HERITAGE SOCIETY TO HOLD FUNDRAISER AT WAC (Jim Piateski)

On Sunday, October 19, 2008, The Damascus Heritage Society will hold a fundraiser at the Wildlife Achievement Chapter. The event is scheduled to run from noon to 5pm. The purpose is to raise money to construct a museum exhibiting the rural heritage of the Damascus area.

As of this writing, some of the planned activities are speakers on local history, a display of antique farm equipment, a turkey shoot, scavenger hunts, chestnut tree tour, a cowboy action shooting demonstration and a beekeeping demonstration. # **CONSERVATION COMMITTEE** (Meo Curtis)

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October Conservation Activities

Managing Non-native Invasive plants

For the September 28th work day, 12 new and old members came in early that morning to learn the 'Sinister Seventeen'-the most problematic non-native invasive plants in Montgomery County- and how to control themand then worked in some of the more visible areas of the Chapter property using these techniques. Most of these plants were deliberately introduced for ornamental, agricultural, or wildlife habitat uses and then 'escaped' into woodlands, parks, and unsuspecting neighbors' yards. The group focused on Oriental bittersweet, Japanese honeysuckle, bush honeysuckle, autumn olive, wineberry, and tree-of-heaven. Thanks to Michelle Chesnut,

Meo has completed the Montgomery County's Department of Parks 'Weed Warrior' training and volunteers in quarterly events to control the major problem species on County parkland. Most of the local parks managers have established volunteer-based 'invasives management' programs and work with community groups to organize local events at various times of the year. As on the Chapter property, repeated and regular 'mechanical' and 'chemical' treatments will be needed to keep these fast-growing and fast-spreading 'pests' under some control. ### **ADULT AIRGUN PROGRAM** (Phil Dean)

Adult air pistol and air rifle shooting is held every Monday night at the indoor airgun range in the Chapter House. We meet at 6:30 PM to set up the range and firing begins at 7:00 PM. Those shooting air pistol generally fire a 60 round match. Those firing air rifles have been doing a somewhat less formal program within

the same timeframe. Firing ends about 8:15 PM followed with cleanup. You can plan to be ready to leave by 8:30 PM - or you can stay for some socialization and leave at about 9:00 PM.

A number of the pistol shooters will be participating in a 'postal match' during November through February. Individual scores fired on specific dates will be submitted to a fellow in Washington State who consolidates them with scores from other shooters from the US and foreign countries and puts out a match bulletin every two weeks. This has proven to be an enjoyable activity that provides an opportunity to see how your shooting 'stacks up' with others across the country. It is also a good way to see how you are improving during the shooting season.

Either air pistols or air rifles can be fired during the Monday night Adult Airgun session. Feel free to bring your own gun or you can use some we have available until you decide the type you want to get on your own. The only cost is a charge of \$1.00 per person per session for the cost of targets. Contact Phillip Dean (301-865-8202) for information. We hope to see some new shooters at our Monday night sessions.

**SHOOTING HOURS:** Permitted rifle and pistol range shooting hours are posted on the box, which contains the range sign-in register, as well as above the range entry card reader. For September 2008, starting time is 10:00AM daily and ending time is 7:30PM, unless some activity has preempted the range (see "UPCOMING EVENTS AFFECTING RANGE AVAILABILITY" below).

#### REMINDERS

Rifle Range Target Placement is permitted at the 50, 75, & 100-yard berms. This is perfect for all center-fire and some rim-fire rifles. If you want to shoot at 25-yard targets with rim-fire ammo then use the covered pistol range, where all currently available rim-fire caliber rifles may be used.

**Rifle and Pistol Range Rules:** The rules governing Rifle and Pistol Range safety, conduct, permissible firearms, and violation policy are posted at the covered pistol range, the covered rifle range, the notice board between the pistol ranges, the notice board at the path leading to the covered rifle range, on the chapter WEB site (damascusiwla.org) and in MS Word format from Tony Evans, via email, when requested. Sometimes questions come up. Though our bylaws indicate that you can call any Board of Directors member about these rules, you will be better served to start with the folks closest to them, i.e., range orientation instructors or the committee chair.

## **GAS SAVING TIPS** (Michelle Chesnut)

Gasoline has become a major expense in many household budgets and most of us do not have a viable alternative to driving. However, no matter what kind of car we drive, most of us can make a few changes in the way we drive that will improve the mileage we get.

Recently, after my car was rear-ended and totaled, I had to purchase a new car. Because gasoline was about \$4.00 per gallon, I wanted a car that got decent gas mileage. To find the mileage estimates for 2008 cars, I went to <a href="www.fueleconomy.gov">www.fueleconomy.gov</a>. In addition to the standard city and highway miles per gallon (MPG) estimates, the website has a measure of the average of "drivers like you". For the car I was interested in the average of was 34.2 MPG, but the range of average mileage was 29 – 45 MPG, a difference of 16 MPG. The major difference in the reported MPG was the person driving. What accounts for this huge difference in average mileage and how could I or anyone else safely maximize mileage? Fueleconomy.gov has several tips for improving gas mileage for any vehicle.

Drive efficiently. This means no "jack-rabbit" starts or stops, no weaving in and out of traffic, no tailgating and the like. Driving less aggressively can save up to 33% on the highway and 5% in town and has the added benefit of being safer for you and those with whom you share the road. Slow down and go the speed limit. This is easier said than done when you have a someone riding your bumper, but when and where possible, slowing down can save up to 23%. Additionally, remove excess weight from the vehicle. This will reduce the overall weight of your car and increase your MPG – how much depends on how much extra weight you remove. If you have a choice of when to drive, drive when traffic is lightest. Traffic jams and other stop and go traffic will substantially decrease MPG since the engine is burning fuel without going anywhere. Combine trips – a warm engine is more efficient than a cold engine.

Keep your vehicle in good repair. Get regular tune-ups (up to 4% MPG improvement), maintain the air filter (up to 10% MPG improvement), and keep tires properly inflated (up to 3% MPG reduction). Using the recommended oil weight and oil that has a label with the "Energy Conserving" performance symbol of the American Petroleum Institute contains friction-reducing additives that can improve fuel economy (1-2% MPG improvement).

For more information and to find out what the fuel ratings are for your vehicle go to <a href="www.fueleconomy.gov">www.fueleconomy.gov</a>. If your mileage is closer to the low end of the range, try some of the above tips. Increasing your gas mileage will save you money.
