FINDING NATIVE PLANTS IN MONTGOMERY COUNTY AND NEARBY

Many folks have contacted me to ask about buying native plants. Throughout the Chesapeake Bay region, there is increasing interest in enhancing and re-establishing native plants in our parks and yards. Wildlife research is showing the importance of native plants for food and habitat throughout the life cycle of our songbirds and beneficial insects. Non-native plants may have fruits or berries that look similar to those from native plants but frequently the non-natives are lower in fats and nutrition. Are you ready to try out or add native plants in your gardens and landscaping but not sure where to find them? Many of the local nurseries carry and label native varieties, but my personal experience has been that staff knowledge and accuracy about natives is highly variable. RIFLE AND PISTOL COMMITTEE

INFORMATION: For m ore information about any rifle or pistol range activitie s mentioned in this article or suggestions for topics for this article contact Jesse Lim (240)832-0354 or <u>alphashooter@usa.com</u>.

SHOOTING HOURS: Per mitted rifle and pis tol range shooting hours are posted on the box, which contain s the range sign-in register, as well as above the range entry card reader. For April 2009, starting time is 10:00AM daily unless some activity has preempted the range (see "UPCOMING EVENTS AFFECTING RANGE AVAILABILITY" below).

REMINDERS

Rifle Range Target Placement is permitted at the 50, 75, & 100-yard berms. This is perfect for all cen ter-fire and some rim-fire rifles. If you want to shoot at 25-yard targets with rim-fire ammo then use the covered pistol range, where all currently available rim-fire caliber rifles may be used.

Rifle and Pistol Range Rules: The rules governing Rifle and Pistol Range safety, conduct, permissible firearms, and violation polic y are p osted at the covered pistol range, the covered rifle range, the notice board between the pistol ranges.

UP-COMING EVENTS AFFECTING RANGE AVAILABILITY:

WAC .22LR Fun Shoot and educational information.(Jesse Lim)

In addition to basic firearm instruction provided by Jesse Lim for novice shooters, more advanced instruction was provided to several participants by Geoff Hornseth, senior coach of our club junior rifle program. Standing shooting was the most popular topic of instruction, followed by questions about ammo selection for accuracy.

Although detailed instruction of how to shoot standing is far beyond the scope of this article, Geoff notes that

the common mistake that nearly all shooters make when shooting standing is incorrectly supporting the rifle. A key item to enhance steadiness is to make sure that (for a right handed shooter) the left elbow is firmly resting against (and supported by) the rib cage. By doing this you avoid muscle fatigue and consequent tremors in addition to gaining bone support.

Ammo selection should always favor standard velocity loads for best accuracy. The commonly available high speed loadings rarely provide the best accuracy. Consequently, Geoff says he never shoots high speed ammo. The more commonly available, and economical, standard velocity loadings are Remington "Target" and "Subsonic", Winchester "T-22", Federal "Gold Medal Target," and CCI "Green Tag Competition." Typically these loadings are available at gun shops but not the big box stores.

Also, since each individual rifle may perform much better with one brand than others, each rifle should be tested with different brands to find the best ammo for that particular rifle. When switching brands of ammo, the bore should be cleaned, or, 5 to 10 shots should be made with the "new" ammo brand before shooting your accuracy test. This is because the different manufacturers use different bullet lubricants and mixing them leads to inconsistent results (poor accuracy) until the new lubricant has displaced all the previous bullet lubricant in the bore.
