Our rain barrel workshop was attended by thirty people all who left with a shiny new rain barrel.

Pigtail Branch Native Tree Planting and Maintenance—Sunday March 17th

It was a cold, raw day but 19 members came out to the WSSC Pigtail area on Sunday March 17th to plant native trees and plants and pull vines from the previous plantings. It looks like we had good survival from last year's plantings of wild cherry and hazelnuts. The crews protected the new plantings from deer browse and deer rub with wire fencing and rebar stakes. This is a continuing project begun about 10 years ago to increase the forested buffer around the WSSC Patuxent Reservoirs.

Much thanks to Jim Piateski for obtaining and transporting the wire mesh and rebar and to Kim Knox from WSSC for providing the trees and shrubs.



Watershed Clean Up—Saturday April 6th.

It was a great weather day and a great turn out for our 33rd plus year Upper Patuxent Watershed Clean up. There were 58 people for the event, so we were able to cover from Windsor Forest Road down to the Georgia Avenue parking lot. We had a bit of an organizational challenge getting the teams assigned and distributed to cover all of the sites, but our Chapter members know how to work together to make sure the job gets done! Alan Zlotkowski and Travis Watts from DNR arrived with a pick up and helped us with transporting bags and other trash back to the pick up site.

Over the years, we have seen a decrease in significant dump sites in our part of the Patuxent Watershed . However, significant littering with fast food packaging and recyclables (cans and bottle) continues. We ended up with quite a mountain of trash that the Montgomery County DOT will carry to the Transfer station. This included 27 tires, 2 sofas, 4 TVs (guess they weren't HD), 1 broken toilet, and once again a propane gas tank, along with about 60 contractor-size bags of litter and some miscellaneous items that didn't fit easily in the bags. When you consider that an average bag weighs about 25 pounds, we picked up about 1,500 pounds of trash just in the bags!

Many thanks to the 'veterans' who helped with logistics: Jeff Deschamps, Rich Fried, Bill Ladd, and Jim Piateski-and guaranteed that no bags and no members got left at the sites! And of course, special thanks to Jose Scoseria, our chef, who guaranteed a hot lunch for all the workers.
