Conservation (Meo Curtis)

Conservation Speaker for May 27th Member Meeting Eddie Franceschi, recently hired as the WSSC Patuxent Watershed Manager, will be our special speaker this month. Eddie was previously with the Montgomery County Soil Conservation District, working on issues related to equine operations and management. He will be here to talk about WSSC properties and public use and to get input on volunteer projects to help protect the Patuxent Reservoirs and the surrounding WSSC watershed lands.

The Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission (WSSC) is responsible for water supply and wastewater treatment for Montgomery and Prince George's Counties. The two Patuxent Reservoirs—Triadelphia and Rocky Gorge—provide water to these two Counties, mainly to Prince George's County. The Chapter's property drains to the Upper Patuxent which then drains to the Triadelphia Reservoir. WSSC Pigtail Site Maintenance-May 7

On Thursday, May 7, four of us worked at the WSSC Pigtail Site to address an issue brought up by WSSC property maintenance staff. WSSC mows this area only twice a year, and by the time they get there, the grass and brushy stuff is pretty tall. In fact, tall enough to hide some of the cages and rebar supports used to protect the trees and shrubs that have been planted there over the past few years. The cages are needed for protection from deer browse and deer rub.

With support from WSSC, we are trying out some marking techniques to make the cages and rebar more visible and easier to miss. Our first try includes spray painting the rebar and attaching surveyor's tape on the top rung of the cages. The first mowing of the season is scheduled for next month, and we'll find out then how successful we've been with our marking.

Tree Montgomery Program For Developed Areas

Tree Montgomery is a new program to increase tree cover in already developed areas in the County. The County's Department of Environmental Protection is looking for appropriate places to plant, especially in yards of single family homes, parking lots, and multi-family communities. Target areas are densely developed, have little tree canopy, or show a real need for shade. Each fall through spring, the County will plant trees and provide up to two-years of maintenance care after planting at no cost to the property-owners. When installed, the trees will be 10 to 12 feet tall and will eventually be more than 50 feet tall to provide decades of benefits. Program funding is provided through the Tree Canopy Law enacted in 2013.

Tree Montgomery will help reverse the loss of tree canopy due to development, storm damage, and the aging of many trees in the County. The program also helps raise awareness of the multiple benefits of trees—including shade and summer cooling, nectar sources for pollinators, and intercepting rainfall and slowing stormwater runoff.

Tree Montgomery's 2015 spring plantings have already been scheduled. To start planning for a fall planting, visitTreeMontgomery.org.

New offsite conservation opportunity (Barry Fleming)

On Sunday April 19 we had a group of 23 come out to do a tree planting and maintenance project at Rachel Carson Park along Sundown Road, east of Laytonsville. This project was coordinated with the help of Katherine Nelson from the Maryland Capital Park and Planning Commission (MNCPPC) who was also in attendance. We planted 28 new trees of which 18 had been purchased by our chapter from Schott Nurseries and another 10 that were donated from Stadler Nurseries. We first worked this area last fall and anticipate being here for some time due to the size and amount of work anticipated. This area is in the western most part of Rachel Carson Park along the banks of Hawlings River. Besides planting the new trees we also repaired or replaced many of the cages that had become too small or had been damaged over time. The Hawlings River is a 13 mile tributary of the Patuxent River and basically starts its journey just north of Laytonsville flowing through Rachel Carson Conservation Park. This newer project, as well as our work at the Brookville site and the ongoing project in conjunction with WSSC at Triadelphia Reservoir, is all about improving the stream water ending up in the Rocky Gorge Reservoir. This reservoir is the source of much of our drinking water in the area. Thanks to all that made this day a success.

Probationary members have a work requirement. Most understand that. But, there is some confusion as to how that work requirement is fulfilled. New members must help with a minimum of two projects in each of their first two years of membership. Failure to do so will prevent a renewal of your membership the following year (you could be charged an additional registration fee in order to renew). When you work on a project you are required to be there for the entire project. You are expected to arrive on time for the project. If you leave early you will not get credit for the project.

In year one of your membership, you are required to work on a minimum of two projects. One of which must be a conservation based project. The second project can be any club project including another conservation event.

In year two, you are required to work on a minimum of two projects. One of which must be a conservation based project. The second project can be any club project including another conservation event.

You cannot work additional projects in year one and have them carried over to year two. The work requirement is set up to span two years with the hope that members will find projects they are interested in and want to support after they have completed their probation.

All projects will have a signup sheet. FIND IT. If you do not sign the sheet we do not mark you as there. It is your responsibility to sign in for proper credit. If you are a probationary member, be sure to check the box that says you are probationary, otherwise it will not be recorded.

Each monthly newsletter will show the credit given, by project, and who was there. Check to see if your name is listed. It is possible your name was not legible.

Mistakes can happen. When they do we want to correct them as soon as possible. Check the newsletter after volunteering and report any error as soon as possible. Our newsletters are archived back to 2005.

Due to the poor legibility of a number of names, I am forced to guesstimate these names. This Thank You list of volunteers is made up of Full Members, Probationary Members and Non-members so my guess could be wrong. If you are working towards getting credit please give me a legible name.

Editor's note: It will make my life much simpler if future submissions are in 12 point Times New Roman font and in Word format.
